Looking back 150 years

When the church was formed in 1869 the world was significantly different. Characters from the "wild west" were just developing a reputation. The battle of Little Big Horn took place in 1869, it was a significant battle in the Indian Wars in Montana. Crazy Horse was the leader of the Lakota nation and involved in battles with the US Armies as settlers moved into the territories. Jesse James committed his first bank robbery, women still did not have the right to vote (except in Wyoming), and Purdue University was founded. In the eastern part of our country, Georgia, Texas, and Mississippi were all readmitted to the United States as the Confederate States (CSA) was dissolved. Much of the south was under reconstruction as the Civil War had ended only 4 years before.

Locally, at First Presbyterian church, there are 6 men listed on the church board.

J.W. Pettit is listed in session minutes throughout the first years we have documents. Dr. Pettit was born in far southern IL in Sparta in 1848. Illinois records indicate that his mother's family was one of the first families to settle in Illinois in 1783. Dr. Pettit graduated from the Louisville Medical College in 1873. He moved to Ottawa shortly after finishing school. One of the first duties he was assigned was to be the Ottawa city Health officer in 1878, and along with this he was LaSalle County Coroner and the LaSalle County Health Officer. He became active in the newly organized National Guard and was a Second Lieutenant in Company C until 1898.

Dr. Pettit had done some research while in medical school and recognized that the recommended treatment for Tuberculosis, involving sending patients to specific climate had no impact on the disease. He began an uphill battle to convince people that climate had no impact on the recovery from TB. In 1904 he formed the Ottawa Tent Colony on the south side of the river (where Ottawa Pavilion is now). He worked with the state legislature to develop state funding for the center but when the funding was cut from \$100,000 (almost \$3,000,000 today) to \$25,000 the governor vetoed the bill because this was not enough money to fund the treatment center. Dr. Pettit developed a private treatment center and patients from all over the United States came for effective treatment. His son was the director of the tent colony, and Dr. Pettit became nationally known for his private treatment clinic. He was president of the state medical association during the time the tent colony was operating.

Dr. Pettit was secretary of the church board in 1876, he was elected for a two year term. He is not mentioned in the minutes after his term ended, and according to the LaSalle County Old and New he passed away leaving a wife and two sons. One son was a physician practicing in Boston, the other son lived in Ottawa and was the business officer for the Tent Colony.

Meanwhile, at FPC the 10 year old church faced financial challenges. The pastor's salary was agreed to be \$624.39 per year with a total budget of \$769.00. The church did not receive that amount in "subscriptions" and ended the year 1879 owing the pastor \$202.66. In today's economy his salary would be around \$17,000 and the church budget total would have been approximately \$20,000. The minutes do not reflect a solution to the issue, and the next minutes were dated 1881.

PLEASE CONSIDER YOUR YEAR-END PER CAPITA CONTRIBUTION

A friendly a reminder to all members who haven't given their per capita of \$36.34 for 2018. Please make checks out to First Presbyterian Church and note "per capita" on the memo line.

Per capita is a fundamental way in which all of the nearly 10,000 congregations and mid councils of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) connect, participate and share in the work of the wider church. Per capita is how Presbyterians mutually and equitably share the costs of the coming together of the Presbyteries and Synods and through the General Assembly.

- It is how Presbyterians are trained to become better ruling elders, teaching elders and deacons and ministers.
- It is how Presbyterians are helped to discern God's call in their lives.
- It is how Presbyterians participate in the life of the wider church by serving on Presbytery, Synod and General Assembly committees and commissions, regardless of distance or financial resources.
- It is how Presbyterians participate in the life of the church universal as we commit ourselves to work and live in fellowship with "all persons of every nation". (Book of Order, G-4.0101)

All Presbyterians are called to take part in the ecclesiastical and administrative work shared by the whole church through per capita giving. The annual rate is a per-member apportionment that is assessed biennially by the General Assembly. (Book of Order, G-4.0106) All congregations—large and small—are encouraged to participate, whither through an annual budget item or through the special direct appeal to their congregations.

NOTE: The largest share of Per Capita goes to fund our local Blackhawk Presbytery ministries, paying for programs and salaries of the numerous good people there who work hard and faithfully to serve all Blackhawk congregations, including First Presbyterian Church in Ottawa.

- Blackhawk Presbytery's share of Per Capita for 2018: \$24.80
- Synod's share (Lincoln Trails): \$3.81
- General Assembly's share: \$7.73
